
encourages them to take ownership of their learning.

Springfield Festival of Learning

During the first week of September, staff and students participated in the biannual Springfield Festival of Learning. On Friday 1st September, the Festival of Learning began with teaching staff involved in a professional learning day. Our keynote speaker was Dr Michael Carr-Gregg, one of Australia's highest profile psychologists, who specialises in mental health, families, parenting, children and adolescents. Teachers were treated to an excellent presentation which provided teachers with current information about mental health issues and strategies for support and to promote positive wellbeing.

Our students were then involved in a range of events throughout the Festival of Learning week, including a number of activities hosted at Woodcrest including the Maths Challenge and the Rising Starts concert. The students who were nominated to participate did our school proud, and we had some wonderful success including the following:

Year 12 Academic Reviews

During the past month our Year 12 students undertook their final Academic Review meeting. During the Academic Review students were supported to review their pathway planning, identify any final interventions for QCE attainment and provided support for the QTAC application process. Thank you to all of the parents/carers who attended to support their student's success. Many thanks also to Ms Hackman and the staff involved in this important process.

Term 3 Reporting

Secondary teachers will complete interim reporting for students across Years 7 - 12 for Term 3. These reports will be published after the school holidays. There will be an opportunity for parents to meet with teachers to discuss their child's progress at the Parent-Teacher Interviews scheduled for Thursday 12^{th} October. More information about the Parent-Teacher interviews will be provided after the holidays when reports are published.

Attendance

This term the secondary campus continued to acknowledge improvement in attendance with our student rewards program. This included weekly prizes for the roll class with the best or most improved attendance, random prize drawers for students with 100% attendance throughout the week and a part for the HOUSE with the best attendance for semester 1. Students who met our attendance target of 93% and above were also acknowledged with a certificate.

We know that regular attendance is a huge indicator of student success. As students move through high school the learning demands become more complex and therefore significant time off school can result in gaps in student learning and increased risk of disengagement as students find it difficult to access their school work.

In 2023, it is our goal that students maintain a yearly attendance rate of 93% and above. Regular attendance at school is vital for both student academic success and student wellbeing. Consistent attendance ensures students have the opportunity to learn and engage with the curriculum and can participate in classroom discussions, ask questions and receive feedback from teachers. Additionally, consistent attendance is also important for building strong relationships with teachers and peers. Students who develop these relationships will experience a sense of community, social support and friendship. We encourage parents and carers to work with the College to ensure students are maximising their learning each and every day.

Bring Your Own Device

Across the school we are using laptops in most lessons to deliver aspects of the curriculum and students regularly use OneNote as their notebook platform. Additionally, teachers use OneNote to provide course materials and other platforms including electronic textbooks.



If students don't bring their devices, it is like turning up without a pencil case, notebook or textbook. Being ready for learning is the first aspect of our school-wide learning framework. I encourage all students to ensure they are ready for learning every day. Any student needing assistance with onboarding their device is asked to go to the IT window before school or during first break.

Additionally, parents/carers may wish to consider the College loan program to enable their child to access a device. To access the loan program, parents/carers must have agreed to be part of the Student Resource Scheme. For more

Parents/Carers Attending the School

A reminder that should your child be required to depart school early for medical appointments the school requires contact from a parent/carer and collection from the Student Services Office where they will be signed out. If you are attending the College for other matters, the expectation is that all visitors including parents/carers sign in through either Student Services or Campus Administration. These services will then contact the relevant staff member upon your arrival. While we understand at times there are emergent matters that need to be attended to, parents and carers are encouraged to contact the school to make appointments to see College staff. Often administration and teaching staff are in meetings before and after school, so meeting requests are essential to ensure parents and carers are afforded the time required to address matters appropriately. Your assistance with these procedures will assist us to ensure the safety and wellbeing of all students.

Festival of Learning

The primary school hosted two events during the 2023 Festival of Learning. Students from the Springfield Learning Coalition of Schools were invited to participate in a P-2 DIG and a Maths Competition. The maths day hosted roughly 38 teams from various schools in our local area. While our little learners, explored different weather events through hands on, play-based experiences. Students posed wonderings about how clouds and rainbows were formed before conducting research and participating in various investigations.

It was great to see the excitement and engagement among everyone who attended the events.

Celebrating Attendance

At Woodcrest State College we understand the importance of attendance in ensuring a successful and fulfilling education for your child, and we're excited to announce our new attendance rewards program.

Zooper Doopers for Winning Classes (P-2 and 3-6): Each week, the class with the most improved attendance will be rewarded with Zooper Doopers for every student in that class.

Lucky Draw Prizes - \$5 Canteen Vouchers: Each week, every student with 100% attendance will automatically be entered into a lucky draw. We are offering a \$5 canteen voucher as the prize for one P-2 student and one 3-6 student.

Attendance Certificates: At the end of each term, students who have achieved 93% attendance will receive a certificate acknowledging their outstanding attendance over the term.

Regular attendance is directly linked to academic success, social development, and building good habits for the future. We encourage you to motivate your child to actively participate in this program. Regular attendance is a collective effort involving students, parents, and teachers. By emphasizing the importance of attendance at home, you can play a significant role in your child's educational journey.



Social Media

More and more the consequences of inappropriate use of social media is spilling over into the school yard. More and more often students are coming to school and engaging in unacceptable conduct which then results in school disciplinary absences or suspensions as a result of online interactions.

Parent responsibilities around social media for school-aged children are crucial to ensuring the safety and well-being of their children. Social media is highly pervasive, and children can access it from almost any device. Parents must be cognisant of their child's exposure to social media content, protect their privacy, and educate children on the safe use of social media platforms.

Parents and guardians must monitor their child's social media use regularly. Social media content ranges from age-appropriate to highly explicit, so parents need to track what their children consume. Monitoring also helps prevent cyber-bullying or the posting of content that can harm a child's reputation or lead to harassment or fights at school. Parents should also ensure that their children are not on platforms which are not designed for their age group by making sure they do not create false profiles by changing their birth date.

Caregivers must ensure that their child's private information remains private, including their name, gender, age, and location. Leaking such information to strangers can betray your child's personal data to predatory people known to be online for exploitation.

Parents should educate their children on safe and proper social media behaviour. Teach children the importance of keeping their profiles private or only allowing friends and family to access, how to report suspicious content and people trying to groom them, and warn against sharing any personal data. Encourage them to ask questions and seek help if they encounter concerns they face online or when bullied.

Finally, parents need to monitor and set boundaries in terms of screen use. As much as possible, discourage your child from spending too much time browsing social media. Setting limits and consequences about screen time will significantly impact the use of social media and how students engage in other activities such as socialising with friends and schoolwork.

To ensure a child's safety, parents have the foremost responsibility and must stay vigilant on their child's social media behaviour, protect their privacy, educate children to practice safety techniques, and set boundaries on screen time. Schools can play a part in supporting parents in this responsibility however this tends to be consumed with managing behaviours from activities students engage in online which spill over into the playground in a negative way.

If your child starts Prep in 2024 and you've completed your enrolment already, don't forget to secure your spot in the Pre-Prep Program.



Four Woodcrest students participated in the recent Mario Kart competition held at Springfield Central State School – **Siwon, Kavin, Gabriel and Alekzander**. Round 1 then kicked off with each student being allocated driver numbers and then allocated a draw and the top 3 from each round progressing into round 2. Round 2 mixed things up with a time trial event where each students' fastest lap would be counted and the top 16 students would again progress.
