

As we approach the mid-way point of the term, I would like to congratulate our students for their commitment to learning and positive involvement in school activities. One of the highlights of the term has been our recent Leadership Investiture ceremony and High Achievers of 2023 Assembly during which we were able to celebrate the success of our Year 12 students and present our new school leaders with their badges.

At the assembly we were very proud to announce our Year 12 Dux for 2023 – Ashely Turner. It was wonderful to have Ashely speak to the students about her experience as a senior student and the strategies she utilised while at school to balance study and other aspects of school life. Ashley is looking forward to an exciting time ahead as she embarks on her university studies and we have no doubt we will hear about the amazing work she is doing in the field of astrophysics in the future. Congratulations also to the other Year 12 students who attended the ceremony, who were recognised for achieving ATAR scores above 80, which means they performed in the top 20% of all students across Oueensland.

It was also with immense pride we recognised our new Junior Secondary ambassadors and our Senior Secondary School Captains, House Captains and Ambassadors. Leadership is not just a position; it is a commitment to service, a dedication to the betterment of our school. At our assembly we commended our new school leaders on their willingness to take on the challenges and responsibilities that come with leading their peers and we know they will do a great job representing our school community and upholding our values of Respect, Responsibility & Resilience.

Outstanding Student Achievement - Semester 2, 2023

In 2023 our secondary students achieved some outstanding results across Years 7-12. Of particular note are the tremendous results in English and Mathematics. On average 85% of students achieved a C or above in English across Years 7-12. Year 7s achieved a 90% pass rate with nearly 50% of the cohort achieving in the A – B range. Additionally, our Year 11 & 12 students on average achieved a pass rate above 96%. In Mathematics, we saw outstanding improvement with an average pass rate of 87% in Years 7-10 and wonderful achievement also in the senior school. A highlight was the outstanding pass rate of Year 7 at 96% and the large numbers of students across Years 7-12 achieving in the A – B range. We celebrated our highest performing students from Semester 2, 2023 during a Year 7-12 assembly, at which students who achieved straight As (GPA of 5.0) across their subjects, received platinum academic awards.

Year 7 Transition to High School

Our Year 7s have overwhelmingly experienced a successful transition to high school. We have enjoyed seeing these young people develop in confidence and create new friendships and enjoy new experiences. In Week 9 we are looking forward to the term culminating in the Year 7 Camp at Camp Somerset. This will be a fantastic time for our students and another chance to come together and create further friendships as a cohort.

Student Assessment

As we move out of our formative assessment phase and into our assessment period, I encourage all students and parents/carers to be familiar with our assessment calendars. These were published via COMPASS and through email last week. These overviews provide students and parents/carers with information about the type of assessments students are undertaking and when drafts and final copies are due.

NAPLAN

Across weeks 8 & 9 of this term our Year 7 and 9 students will undertake the National Assessment Program – Literacy & Numeracy (NAPLAN). Prior to NAPLAN, students will undertake practice sessions to ensure test readiness in relation to the online platform used to conduct the testing. I encourage all parents and carers to refer to the detailed information provided via email regarding NAPLAN preparation to ensure their child is familiar and prepared to undertake these assessments.

Bring Your Own Device (BYOD) Laptops

It is a school learning expectation that all secondary students have a BYOD laptop to engage with our curriculum program. Over the coming days and weeks, teachers will continue to release lesson plans and resources to students via Microsoft OneNote. Students need to engage with these resources on a daily basis and therefore it is imperative

all students have a BYOD device. Additionally, students require a laptop in order to access their eBooks (including textbooks and novels), COMPASS (school intranet) and school email.

If your child has a laptop, but is yet to onboard their device to the school's network please refer to the college website which provides links to information about how to do onboard. Furthermore, students can receive assistance from the BYOD Window before school (8.20am - 8.50am) and at first break (11.20am-12.10pm). Attendance

In 2024 it is our goal that students maintain a yearly attendance rate of 88% and above and it is expected that all senior students have an attendance rate of 93% or greater as part of their senior schooling agreement. Regular attendance at school is vital for both student academic success and student wellbeing. Consistent attendance ensures students have the opportunity to learn and engage with the curriculum and can participate in classroom discussions, ask questions and receive feedback from teachers. Additionally, consistent attendance is also important for building strong relationships with teachers and peers. Students who develop these relationships will experience a sense of community, social support and friendship.

Did you know that if a student has one day off in a fortnight this equates to an attendance percentage of only 90%? Over 12 years of schooling, this would equate to more than a year of learning missed. If you need support with assisting your child engage with school, please don't hesitate to contact the Deputy Principal of your child's year level to discuss strategies to assist.

Homework Centre

Our homework centre is up and running again for 2024. The Homework Centre is open on Monday – Thursday between 3pm – 3:45pm in the Secondary Library. Students who attend are able to be supported with their homework by college staff. Additionally, across the week a range of teachers stay back and provide tutorials. Students who attend are provided with afternoon tea. Students in Years 7 – 10 require parental permission to attend Homework Centre. NAPLAN INFORMATION

Year 3, Year 5, Year 7 and Year 9 students will be sitting the NAPLAN test at scheduled times between Wednesday 13th March and Monday 25th March. All Year 3, 5, 7 and 9 students across Australia will participate in the National Assessment Program - Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN).

NAPLAN assessment is online and at Woodcrest State College students are encouraged to use their own device to complete the tests.

In preparation for NAPLAN 2024, Woodcrest State College needs to go through a series of 'readiness tests' which will provide us with data and information about the things Woodcrest needs to do in order to be completely ready and functional for 2024 NAPLAN assessments. The school readiness tests examine;

our school network capacity student device capability student ICT capabilities and test awareness staff capabilities to prepare and administer tests.

This 'school readiness test' will take place between Monday February 19th and Friday February 23rd. Students in year 3 will use the school iPads for the 'school readiness test' and the NAPLAN test proper.

Students who have BYOD in years 5, 7 and 9 will need to download the "NAP Lock down browser" onto their devices. The 'NAP Locked down browser' **allows students to securely participate in NAPLAN** and NAP Sample tests on the Online National Assessment Platform. Students will also require headphones. The browser can download and installed at home ready for NAPLAN testing. Please click on the link or copy and paste into your browser below.

The application regulates access to utilities and system functions, prevents application switching and unauthorised device resources being used during an assessment. It is a free app that needs to be installed on all BYOD and school-based devices before we can administer the readiness test.

On the test days students will be assessed through five assessment tasks in the areas of Reading, Writing, Language Conventions and Numeracy. Year 3 students will be completing their writing test on paper.

NAPLAN is only a small measure of your student's achievement, however at Woodcrest State College, we use the information we gather from our school's performance to go back and review the success of learning strategies that we have implemented to determine what areas we need to improve or focus on. Assessments provide the school with information about school directions and priorities.

We make every effort to minimise any anxiety your student may have about the NAPLAN test. Your student will sit the test each day in the same room, with the same teacher reading the instructions. In most cases, it will be your child's teacher/s supervising the test.

All eligible Year 3, 5, 7 and 9 students at Woodcrest State College must sit for the tests unless they are exempt or withdrawn by parents/carers.

Students may qualify for an exemption because of:

- Their lack of proficiency in the English language;
- · Significant intellectual and/or functional disability;

· If the parents/carers believe the test is in conflict with their religious beliefs or there is a philosophical objection to completing the test.

Parents/carers wishing to withdraw a student from the NAPLAN testing must complete the Record of Parent/Carer Withdrawal form in accordance with point 1 or 2 above, or the Notice of parent withdrawal form for point 3.

Adjustments are provided to students with disability, in consultation with parents/carers and students to enable an equivalent learner experience during NAPLAN testing and to encourage maximum participation. If you require support in applying for reasonable adjustments, please contact the school on 07 3280 2444. Parents/carers must complete a Record of Adjustment for Disability form.

These forms can be obtained from Campus Student Services and must be returned to Campus Student Services window no later than 8th March 2024. Exceptions and withdrawals need to be in before the NAPLAN test starts on the 13th March 2024.

What is PBL?

Ever wondered what PBL stands for? It's Positive Behaviour for Learning!

PBL is more than just a plan; it's a commitment to creating a positive, nurturing environment where our students thrive.

Here's what it's all about:

Making our school a positive place to learn.

Teaching students essential behavior skills for success.

Recognizing and celebrating when our students do the right thing.

Supporting them when mistakes happen.

Collaborating closely with you, the parents!

Every fortnight, we have a key focus from our core values. So for this week, it's RESPECT - I will follow directions first time, every time.

Week 5 & 6: RESPONSIBILITY - I will be at the right place at the right time

Week 7 & 8: RESPECT - I will keep hands, feet and objects to myself

Week 9 & 10: RESILIENCE - I will use strategies to cope and adapt to challenging situations (assessment)













Welcome to Stymie, it's really great to be part of the **Woodcrest State College** community!

So, what is Stymie? Stymie is an old fashioned word that means to stop or thwart.

Stymie is an online, confidential messaging service for anyone who is needing help or is concerned about someone

else. Stymie provides a proactive opportunity for students to say something about harmful behaviours or anything

they are concerned about for themselves, or someone else.

It works, because it is accessible 24/7, anonymous, easy to use and messages are typically delivered in a few seconds to approved notification recipients.

We highlight issues and behaviours in society that are concerning, and how easily we too can be bystanders. What we do, complements the wellbeing framework that already exists in your school.

Important information on the background and details about Stymie.

Our evidence-based notification system draws on 25 years of leadership experience in education, corporate Australia, sport, clubs and associations and a research base founded in wellbeing and mental health.

Stymie is a web app, that delivers encrypted, anonymous and confidential notifications and where possible,

uploaded evidence including screenshots to authorised recipients about issues of abuse, harm and unacceptable behaviour.

Our focus is on breaking the cycle of harm and abuse through education, intervention and prevention. We know that the first step (in breaking the cycle of harm) is to reduce the stigma associated with reaching out for help.

Since launching we have introduced Stymie to more than 775 000 students.

We are now operating in over 200 schools in Australia, together with New Zealand and The UAE.

What happens next?

Students are free to use the Stymie notification system - Stymie.com.au

We keep in touch with every school, every week of every term. We do this by providing what we call *focus posts* to all our schools to share with their students. These focus posts are shared by schools in a variety of ways including in newsletters, school intranet, at school assemblies, and on social media.

They do this because the focus posts are for the students, they are a reminder that Stymie is there for them every single day.

How can Guidance Officers support you and your child?



School Zone Safety - Advice for Motorists, Parents and Carers

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With school back for 2024, we need to keep safety top-of-mind when travelling through active school zones and around our school community.

School zone times have been standardised in Queensland to help motorists remember when to slow down. The standard operating times for most school zones in Queensland are 7–9am and 2–4pm, with some operating all day between 7am–4pm.

Speeding remains a significant concern, contributing to fatalities and injuries, and police will be on the lookout for speeding motorists. Keeping below the signed speed limit in school zones helps keep everyone safe. This simple adjustment may have minimal impact on travel time but has the potential to significantly contribute to saving lives.

Children's crossings are identified by children's crossing flags, displayed near crossings before and after school hours.

When the crossing is supervised, you, as a motorist, must:

Wait until all pedestrians, bicycle riders, or personal mobility device riders have crossed the road and the crossing supervisor has returned to the footpath.

Abide by the direction given by the School Crossing Supervisor.

Please keep our children safe by staying alert, slowing down and obeying our school crossing supervisors who are there to help kids cross the road safely.

You can also help children become more road safety aware by:

Showing them how to look for vehicles coming in and out of driveways and discourage them from playing behind parked cars, or with toys or balls when walking to school.

Ensuring your child knows the safest route to and from school. This is usually the way with the least traffic and the fewest roads to cross and teach your child to always walk on footpaths.

Showing your child how to cross at traffic lights when the green 'walk' sign is showing at pedestrian crossings when vehicles have stopped and at supervised school crossings when the supervisor has signalled it is safe to do so.

Accompanying children when walking or riding to school until they are old enough to understand road safety (usually around 10 years or older).

Teaching your child if they catch the bus to never cross in front of or behind a bus; wait until the bus goes before crossing the road.

Making sure wheeled devices (bicycle, scooter, skateboard, or rollerblades) used to travel to school are well maintained and that the appropriate protective and safety gear (for example, helmet, visible clothing, knee and elbow pads) are used.
